In this constitution, the following definitions apply throughout:

- "2005 Act" means the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and every statutory modification and re-enactment thereof for the time being in force.
- "AGM" means an Annual General Meeting.
- "Board" means the Board of Charity Trustees.
- "Charity" means a body entered in the Scottish Charity Register as defined under section 106 of Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005.
- "Charity Trustees" means the persons having the general control and management of the Organisation.
- "Clauses" means any clause.
- "Clear days", in relation to notice of a meeting, means a period excluding the day when notice is given and the day of the meeting.
- "Community" has the meaning given in clause 4.
- "GM" means a General Meeting.
- "Group" means those other organisations (incorporated or not) that are not this organisation.
- "Individual" means a human/person.
- "Members" means those individuals and groups who have joined this organisation.
- "Organisation" means the SCIO whose constitution this is.
- "OSCR" means the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator"
- "Property" means any property, assets or rights, heritable or moveable, wherever situated in the world.
- "SCIO" means Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation.
- "them" and "their" refer to individuals or groups (either he, she or they).

Words in the singular include the plural and words in the plural include the singular.

These Clauses supersede any model clauses. Any words or expressions defined in the 2005 Act shall, if not inconsistent with the subject or context, bear the same meanings in the Clauses.

The Schedule to these Clauses is deemed to form an integral part of these Clauses.

	NAME
1	The name of the organisation is "The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre" ("the Organisation").
2	The Organisation will, upon registration, be a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO).
	REGISTERED OFFICE
3	The principal office of the organisation will be in Scotland (and must remain in Scotland).
	Registered at Grange Centre, Redding Road, Brightons FK2 0AA
	DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY AND PURPOSES
4	The Organisation has been formed to benefit the people of the Lower and Upper Braes local council (Ward 8 and 9), Falkirk (the "Community"), with the following purposes (the "Purposes"):
4.1	The advancement of citizenship or community development within the Upper and Lower Braes and surrounding areas to facilitate social interaction
4.2	The advancement of educational equity, in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the conditions of life for the persons for whom the facilities or activities are primarily intended.
4.3	To provide, or assist in the provision of, facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation, where such provision or assistance is: a) in the interests of social welfare; b) made with the object of improving the conditions of the life of the members of the community in the area of benefit & for the purposes to associate with voluntary organisations and inhabitants in the area of benefit.
	POWERS
5	The SCIO has power to do anything which is calculated to further its purposes or is conducive or incidental to doing so.
	In particular, (but without limiting the range of powers available under the 2005 Act), the SCIO has power:
5.1	To encourage and develop a spirit of voluntary or other commitment by, or co-operation with, individuals, unincorporated associations, societies, federations, partnerships, corporate bodies, agencies, undertakings, local authorities, unions, co-operatives, trusts and others and any groups or groupings thereof willing to assist the Organisation to achieve the Purposes
5.2	To promote and carry out research, surveys and investigations and to promote, develop and manage initiatives, projects and programmes
5.3	To provide advice, consultancy, training, tuition, expertise and assistance

5.4	To prepare, organise, promote and implement training courses, exhibitions, lectures, seminars, conferences, events and workshops, to collect, collate, disseminate and exchange information and to prepare, produce, edit, publish, exhibit and distribute clauses, pamphlets, books and other publications, tapes, motion and still pictures, music and drama and other materials, all in any medium
5.5	To purchase, take on lease, hire, or otherwise acquire any property suitable for the organisation
5.6	To construct, convert, improve, develop, conserve, maintain, alter and demolish any buildings or erections whether of a permanent or temporary nature, and manage and operate (or arrange for the professional or other appropriate management and operation of) the organisation's property
5.7	To sell, let, hire, license, give in exchange and otherwise dispose of all or any part of the property of the organisation
5.8	To establish and administer a building fund or funds or guarantee fund or funds or endowment fund or funds
5.9	To employ, contract with, train and pay such staff (whether employed or self-employed) as are considered appropriate for the proper conduct of the activities of the organisation
5.10	To take such steps as may be deemed appropriate for the purpose of raising funds for the activities of the organisation
5.11	To accept subscriptions, grants, donations, gifts, legacies and endowments of all kinds, either absolutely, conditionally or in trust
5.12	To borrow or raise money for the Purposes and to give security in support of any such borrowings by the organisation and/or in support of any obligations undertaken by the organisation
5.13	To set aside funds not immediately required as a reserve or for specific purposes
5.14	To invest any funds which are not immediately required for the activities of the organisation in such investments as may be considered appropriate, which may be held in the name of a nominee organisation under the instructions of the Board of Trustees, and to dispose of, and vary, such investments
5.15	To make grants or loans of money and to give guarantees
5.16	To establish, manage and/or support any other charity, and to make donations for any charitable purpose falling within the purposes
5.17	To establish, operate and administer and/or otherwise acquire any separate trading organisation or association, whether charitable or not
5.18	To enter into any arrangement with any organisation, government or authority which may be advantageous for the purposes of the activities of the organisation and to enter into any arrangement for co-operation, mutual assistance, or sharing profit with any charitable organisation

5.19	To enter into contracts to provide services to or on behalf of others
5.20	To effect insurance of all kinds (which may include indemnity insurance in respect of Trustees and employees)
5.21	To oppose, or object to, any application or proceedings which may prejudice the interests of the organisation
5.22	To pay the costs of forming the organisation and its subsequent development
5.23	To carry out the Purposes as principal, agent, contractor, trustee or in any other capacity.
	GENERAL STRUCTURE OF THE ORGANISATION
6	The organisation is composed of:
6.1	Members (composed of Ordinary Members and Junior Members)
6.2	Associates (as defined in clause 19)
6.3	Charity Trustees (composed of Elected Charity Trustees and Co-Opted Charity Trustees, following the first GM).
	MEMBERSHIP
7	The members of the organisation shall consist of those individuals who made the application for registration of the organisation and such other individuals and groups as are admitted to membership under the following clauses.
8	The organisation shall have not fewer than 20 members at any time
8.1	If the number of members falls below 20 the Board may conduct only essential business other than taking steps to ensure the admission of sufficient Ordinary Members to achieve the minimum number.
9	Membership of the organisation is open to:
9.1	Individuals aged 16 or over who (and groups which) are members of the Community ("Ordinary Members") and who's name appears on the electoral role
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9.2	Individuals aged between 12 and 15 who are members of the Community ("Junior Members") (such Members not being eligible to serve as Charity Trustees or vote).
9.3	, , ,
	Members") (such Members not being eligible to serve as Charity Trustees or vote). If an Individual or group ceases to fulfil the criteria within clause 9.1 or 9.2, that Individual or group must inform the Organisation. The Organisation may choose to

	APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP
10	No Individual or Group may become a Member unless that Individual or Group has submitted a written application for membership in the form prescribed by the Charity Trustees and the Charity Trustees have approved the application. An application submitted by a Group must be signed on behalf of that Group.
10.1	The Charity Trustees shall consider applications for membership promptly. The Charity Trustees shall assess each application to determine whether the applicant meets the criteria for becoming an Ordinary Member or Junior Member.
11	Membership of the organisation may not be transferred by a member.
	MEMBERSHIP SUBSCRIPTIONS
12	Members may be required to pay an annual membership subscription.
12.1	Annual subscriptions (if any) shall be set by Members at the AGM. Different rates may be set for Ordinary Members and Junior Members.
12.2	Any Individual or Organisation who/which ceases to be a Member shall not be entitled to a refund of their/its membership subscription.
	RE-REGISTRATION OF MEMBERS
13	The Board may, at any time, issue notices to the members requiring them to confirm that they wish to remain as members of the organisation and allowing them a period of 28 days (running from the date of issue of the notice) to provide that confirmation to the Board.
13.1	If a member fails to provide confirmation to the Board (in writing or by e-mail) that they wish to remain as a member of the organisation before the expiry of the 28-day period referred to in clause 13, the Board may expel them from the membership.
13.2	A notice under clause 13 will not be valid unless it refers specifically to the consequences (under clause 13.1) of failing to provide confirmation within the 28-day period.
	LIABILITY OF MEMBERS
14	The members of the organisation have no liability to pay any sums to help to meet the debts (or other liabilities) of the organisation if it is wound up accordingly, if the organisation is unable to meet its debts, the members will not be held responsible.
15	The members and Charity Trustees have certain legal duties under the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and clause 14 does not exclude (or limit) any personal liabilities they might incur if they are in breach of those duties or in breach of other legal obligations or duties that apply to them personally.
	CESSATION OF MEMBERSHIP
16	A member shall cease to be a member if:

16.1	That Member sends a written notice of resignation to registered office of the Organisation they will cease to be a member as from the time when the notice is received by the organisation
16.2	That Member has failed to pay an annual membership subscription (where applicable) for over six months and has received at least one written reminder, and the Board has resolved to expel that Member:
16.3	That Member has failed to respond to any re-registration request under clause 13
16.4	A resolution that that Member be expelled (where that Member's conduct, in their/its capacity as a Member, has been detrimental to the effective functioning of the Organisation – including offensive, racist/sexist or inflammatory remarks) is passed by special resolution at a GM (notice of which shall state: (a) the full text of the resolution proposed within 21 days of the GM (b) the grounds on which it is proposed) at which the Member is entitled to be heard and is permitted a chaperone if requested
16.5	In the case of an Individual, that Individual has died (membership of the Organisation not being transferable)
16.6	In the case of a group, that group goes into receivership or liquidation, or is dissolved or otherwise ceases to exist (membership of the Organisation not being transferable)
16.7	Where the Member is a Charity Trustee of the Organisation, that Member has failed to comply with the code of conduct for Trustees in a manner which would result in them ceasing to be a Trustee and a member.
17	All required cessation of Membership disputes shall be voted on by majority vote of two thirds of the Charity Trustees.
	REGISTER OF MEMBERS
18	The Board must keep a register of members, setting out for each current member: a) Their full name b) Their address c) Email address d) Contact number e) Date on which they were registered as a member of the organisation.
18.1	Where any member is not an individual, the register must also contain: a) Any other name by which the member is known b) The principal contact for the member c) Any number assigned to it in the Scottish Charity Register, if it is a charity d) Any number with which it is registered as a company, if it is a company.
18.2	For each former member the register must set out, for at least six years from the date on they ceased to be a member:

	a) Their name
	e) Date on which they ceased to be a member.
18.3	b) The Board must ensure that the register of members is updated within 28 days of receiving notice of any change.
18.4	If a member or Charity Trustee of the Organisation requests a copy of the register of members, the Board must ensure that a copy is supplied to them within 28 days, providing the request is reasonable. If the request is made by a member (rather than a Charity Trustee), the Board may provide a copy which has the addresses blanked out.
	ASSOCIATES
19	Individuals and Groups wishing to support the Purposes who are not members of the Community may become associates of the Organisation ("Associates"). Associates may attend and speak at GMs but may not participate in such meetings for voting or quorum purposes.
19.1	No Individual or Group may become an Associate unless that Individual or Group has submitted a written application to become an Associate in the form prescribed by the Charity Trustees and the Charity Trustees have approved the application. An application submitted by a Group must be signed on behalf of that Group.
19.2	The Charity Trustees shall consider applications for associateship promptly. The Charity Trustees shall assess each application to determine whether the applicant meets the criteria for becoming an Associate.
20	The Charity Trustees shall cause a register of associates to be maintained containing:
	a) The name and address of each Associate
	b) The date on which each Individual or Group was registered as an Associate
	c) The date at which any Individual or Organisation ceased to be an Associate.
21	An Associate shall cease to be an Associate if:
21.1	That Associate sends a written notice of resignation to the Organisation
21.2	That Associate becomes a member of the Community
21.3	A resolution that that Associate be expelled from being an Associate (where that Associate's conduct, in their capacity as Associate, has been detrimental to the effective functioning of the Organisation) is passed by special resolution at a GM (notice of which shall state: (a) the full text of the resolution proposed (b) the grounds on which it is proposed) at which the Associate is entitled to be heard)
21.4	In the case of an Individual: a) that Individual becomes insolvent or apparently insolvent or makes any arrangement with their creditors or b) that Individual has died or

21.5	In the case of a Group, that Group goes into receivership or liquidation, or is dissolved or otherwise ceases to exist.
	GENERAL MEETINGS (Meetings of the Members)
22	The Board may call a GM at any time and must call a GM within 28 days of a valid requisition. To be valid, such requisition must be signed by at least 5% of the Members, must clearly state the purposes of the meeting, and must be delivered to the registered office of the Organisation. The requisition may consist of several documents in like form each signed by one or more of the Members.
	Annual General Meeting
23	The Board shall convene one GM a year as an AGM in the month of OCTOBER. An AGM need not be held during the calendar year during which the Organisation is incorporated, provided an AGM is held within 15 months of the date of incorporation. Thereafter, not more than 15 months shall elapse between one AGM and the next.
23.1	The business of each AGM shall include:
	(a) a report by the Chairperson on the activities of the Organisation
	(b) the election of Elected Charity Trustees
	(c) the fixing of annual subscriptions including a Treasurers Report
	(d) consideration of the accounts of the Organisation
	(e) a report of the auditor if applicable
	(f) the appointment of the auditor if applicable.
	Notice of General Meetings
24	Subject to the terms of clause 67, notice of a GM shall be given as follows:
24.1	At least 14 Clear Days' notice must be given of any GM.
24.2	The notice must specify the place, date and time of the GM, the general nature of business to be dealt with at the meeting
	(a) in the case of a resolution to alter the constitution, must set out the exact terms of the proposed alteration(s)
	(b) in the case of any special resolution (as defined in clause 30) must set out the exact terms of the resolution.
24.3	Notice of every member's meeting must be given to all the members of the organisation, and to all the Charity Trustees but the accidental omission to give notice to one or more members will not invalidate the proceedings at the meeting.
	CHAIRPERSON OF GENERAL MEETINGS
25	The Chairperson of the organisation shall act as Chairperson of each GM.

	If the Chairperson is not present or willing to do so the Vice-Chairperson of the organisation shall act as Chairperson of the GM.
	If neither the Chairperson nor the Vice-Chairperson is present or willing to act as Chairperson of the GM within 15 minutes after the time at which it was due to start, the Charity Trustees present shall elect from among themselves one of the Elected Charity Trustees who will act as Chairperson of that GM.
	QUORUM AT GENERAL MEETINGS
26	The quorum for a GM shall be the greater of:
	(a) eleven Members or
	(b) 10% of the Members,
	present either in person or by proxy.
	No business shall be dealt with at any GM unless a quorum is present. Each meeting will commence at 7pm and last between 1-2 hours.
26.1	If a quorum is not present within 15 minutes after the time at which the GM was due to start (or if, during a GM, a quorum ceases to be present) the GM shall be adjourned until such time, date and place as may be fixed by the Chairperson of the GM, usually within 14 days
26.2	The Board may make arrangements in advance of a GM to allow members (or their proxies) to fully participate remotely, so long as all those participating in the meeting can communicate with each other and all Members (or their proxies) may vote during the meeting. A Member or proxy participating remotely by such means shall be deemed to be present in person at the GM.
26.3	In the event of any Members of the Public being present at the meeting, they will not participate in the business of the meeting, except at the discretion of the chairperson.
	VOTING AT GENERAL MEETINGS
27	The Chairperson of the meeting shall endeavour to achieve consensus wherever possible but, if necessary, questions arising shall be decided by being put to the vote.
27.1	Each eligible Member shall have one vote, to be exercised in person or by proxy, by a show of hands
27.2	A secret ballot may be demanded by:
	(a) the chairperson of the GM or
	(b) at least two Members present at the GM,
	before a show of hands and must be taken immediately and in such manner as the chairperson of the GM directs. The result of a secret ballot shall be declared at that GM.

28	Whilst the attendance of Members at GMs is encouraged, a Member may appoint a proxy to attend a GM on behalf of that Member. A proxy appointed to attend and vote at a GM on behalf of a Member need not be a Member and shall have the same rights as the Member who appointed them to speak and vote at the GM.
28.1	The form appointing the Proxy shall be in the form set out in Schedule 1 annexed to these Clauses
28.2	The form appointing a proxy and the power of attorney or other authority (if any) under which it is signed, or a certified copy thereof, shall be lodged at the Registered Office not less than 48 hours before the time of the GM at which the proxy is to be used
28.3	No form of proxy shall be valid more than 12 months from the date it was granted.
29	In the event of an equal number of votes for and against any resolution, the Chairperson of the meeting shall have a casting vote in their capacity as a member of the organisation.
	Resolutions
30	At any GM an Ordinary Resolution put to the vote of the meeting may be passed by a simple majority of the Members voting (in person or by proxy).
31	Certain resolutions must be passed as Special Resolutions, including resolutions:
	a) to alter the name of the Organisation or
	b) to amend this Constitution
	c) to wind up the Organisation in terms of clause 71.
	At any GM a Special Resolution put to the vote of the meeting may be passed by not less than two thirds of the Members voting (in person or by proxy).
32	Ordinary and Special Resolutions may be passed in writing, rather than at a General Meeting, and shall have effect as if they had been passed at a GM, provided the terms of this Clause are followed.
32.1	An Ordinary Resolution may be passed in writing if signed by a simple majority of all the Members.
32.2	A Special Resolution to wind up the Organisation may be passed in writing if signed by all the Members.
32.3	Any other Special Resolution may be passed in writing if signed by not less than two thirds of all the Members.
32.4	Written resolutions must be sent to all Members at the same time (the "Circulation Date") in hard copy (posted or hand-delivered) or electronic form (e-mailed), or by means of a website.
32.5	Written resolutions must be accompanied by a statement informing the Member: (a) how to signify agreement to the resolution

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	(b) how to return the signed resolution to the Organisation (in hard copy (posted or hand-delivered) or electronic form (e-mailed))
	(c) the date by which the resolution must be passed if it is not to lapse (that is, the date which is 28 days after the Circulation Date)
	that they will not be deemed to have agreed to the resolution if they fail to reply.
32.6	A written resolution may consist of several documents in the same form, each signed by or on behalf of one or more Members.
32.7	Once a Member has signed and returned a written resolution in agreement thereto, that Members' agreement is irrevocable.
32.8	The Members may require the Organisation to circulate a written resolution.
32.8.1	The resolution must be requested by at least 5% of the Members. Requests must be in hard copy (posted or hand-delivered) or electronic form (faxed or e-mailed), must identify the resolution and may be accompanied by a statement not exceeding 1,000 words which the Organisation will also be required to circulate.
32.8.2	The Board may reject the resolution but must provide justifiable reasons for doing so to the members requesting the resolution.
32.8.3	If accepted, the Organisation must circulate the resolution and any accompanying statement within 21 days and may require the requesting Members to cover the expenses it incurs circulating the resolution.
	MEETING ADJOURNMENT
33	The Chairperson of the GM may, with the consent of a majority of the Members voting (in person or by proxy), adjourn the General Meeting to such time, date and place as the Chairperson may determine.
	ORGANISATION MANAGEMENT
34	The affairs, property and funds of the organisation shall be directed and managed by a Board of Charity Trustees. The Board:
34.1	Shall set the strategy and policy of the Organisation
34.2	Shall, where no employees or managers are appointed, be responsible for the day-to-day management of the Organisation
34.3	Shall hold regular meetings between each AGM, meeting as often as necessary to despatch all business of the Organisation
34.4	Shall monitor the financial position of the Organisation
34.5	Shall direct and manage the affairs and Property of the Organisation
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34.6	Shall generally control and supervise the activities of the Organisation
34.7	May, on behalf of the Organisation, do all acts which may be performed by the Organisation (other than those required to be performed by the Members at a GM)
34.8	May exercise the powers of the Organisation
34.9	May not also be paid employees of the Organisation.
	INTERIM BOARD
35	Upon incorporation of the organisation, the individuals who signed the Charity Trustee declaration forms which accompanied the application for incorporation of the organisation shall be deemed to have been appointed by the members as Charity Trustees with effect from the date of incorporation of the Organisation.
35.1	The Interim Board shall retire at the first GM, which shall be held as soon as practicable following incorporation but shall remain eligible for re-election.
	COMPOSITION OF THE BOARD OF CHARITY TRUSTEES
36	The number of Charity Trustees shall be not less than three and the total number of Charity Trustees shall not be more than 12.
	APPOINTMENT OF CHARITY TRUSTEES
37	From and after the first General Meeting of the organisation, the Board shall comprise the following individual persons (a majority of whom shall always be Elected Charity Trustees):
37.1	Up to 9 individual persons elected as Charity Trustees by the Members in accordance with clause 37 ("the Elected Charity Trustees"), who must themselves be Ordinary Members in accordance with Clause 9
37.2	Up to 3 individual persons co-opted in accordance with clause 38 ("the Co-opted Charity Trustees"), to ensure a spread of skills and experience within the Board.
37.3	Employees of the organisation may not be nominated as or become Charity Trustees.
	ELECTED CHARITY TRUSTEES
38	At the first General Meeting of the Organisation, the Members shall elect up to 9 individual Ordinary Members as Elected Charity Trustees, who will stand in office for a period of 2 years. And up to 3 individual Co-Opted Members, which will stand in office for a period of 1 year.
38.1	Elected Charity Trustees must be nominated in writing by at least two Members. Such nominations must contain confirmation from the nominee that they are willing to act as an Elected Charity Trustee and must be delivered to the registered office of the Organisation at least seven days before the GM.

38.2	Each Member has one vote for each vacancy in the Elected Charity Trustees on the
	Board.
38.3	Provided the first GM is not also the first AGM, there shall be no changes in the Charity Trustees at the first AGM (except to fill any vacancies left following the first GM or caused by retirals since the first GM).
38.4	At the third and subsequent bi-yearly AGMs, one-third of the Elected Charity Trustees (rounding upwards if this is not a whole number) shall retire from office at the close or adjournment of that meeting.
38.5	A retiring Charity Trustee shall be eligible for re-election immediately.
38.6	The Elected Charity Trustee(s) to retire at an AGM shall be those who have been longest in office since their election/re-election (unless other Elected Charity Trustee(s) have agreed to retire at that AGM). As between Individuals who were appointed as Elected Charity Trustees on the same date, the Elected Charity Trustee(s) to retire shall be agreed between the Individuals appointed on the same date or determined by lot.
	CO-OPTED CHARITY TRUSTEES
39	Subject to clause 35, the Charity Trustees may appoint Individuals as Charity Trustees to ensure a spread of skills and experience within the Board ("Co-opted Charity Trustees") and may remove a Co-opted Charity Trustee at any time.
39.1	A Co-opted Charity Trustee shall retire at the AGM following their appointment unless re-appointed by the Charity Trustees.
39.2	A Co-opted Charity Trustee can be removed from office at any time by a simple majority of the Board.
39.3	A proposed Co-opted Charity Trustee must be agreed upon by two thirds of the Elected Charity Trustees
39.4	For the avoidance of doubt, a Co-opted Charity Trustee may participate fully in at all Board meetings which they attend and is eligible to vote at them.
	VACANCY
40	The Board may from time to time fill any casual vacancy arising as a result of the retiral (or deemed retiral for any reason) of any Elected Charity Trustee from or after the date of such retiral or deemed retiral until the next AGM.
	CHARITY TRUSTEES – GENERAL DUTIES
41	Each of the Charity Trustees has a duty, in exercising functions as a Charity Trustee, to act in the interests of the organisation and must:
41.1	Seek, in good faith, to ensure that the organisation acts in a manner which is in accordance with its purposes

41.2	act with the care and diligence which it is reasonable to expect of a person who is managing the affairs of another person
41.3	in circumstances giving rise to the possibility of a conflict of interest between the organisation and any other party, put the interests of the organisation before that of the other party where any other duty prevents them from doing so, disclose the conflicting interest to the organisation and refrain from participating in any deliberation or decision of the other Charity Trustees with regard to the matter in question
41.4	ensure that the organisation complies with any direction, requirement, notice or duty imposed under or by virtue of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005.
41.5	Be fully inclusive and will not be seen to discriminate on the grounds of sex, race, sexual orientation, disability, gender reassignment/preference, political or religious belief, pregnancy or maternity, marital status or age.
42	In addition to the duties outlined in clause 40, all the Charity Trustees must take such steps as are reasonably practicable for the purpose of ensuring:



Community Proposal

We are a community group looking to save the Grange Community Centre from closure. Since May, we have been marketing the centre as a Sports and Wellbeing facility as we believe our Games Hall to be our unique selling point over all other community centres in the local area. With the potential closure of Polmont Sports Centre in 2025, we may be the only games hall venue in the area. As well as being able to secure a commercial gym and a sports Massage Therapist to rent permanent/long-term space within the centre, we have also been able to increase our Games Hall usage to 40% capacity through local community engagement and engaging Social Media posts. Our committee team mostly consist of representatives from each the groups using the centre as well as members of the community therefore all have a vested interest in making the centre a success. We have a variety of sports groups and clubs using the centre now: Badminton, Basketball, Golf, Football, Table Tennis, Meta Fit, Yoga, Archery, Dance lessons and Rollerblading. We also have support and educational groups: Speakers Club and Women's Support Group.

Our community engagement survey had a fantastic response of 325 unique respondents, all with support and encouragement of how to better the centre. We reviewed all requests and accommodated where possible to make the centre what it is today and will be in the future, for the community.

All the above is carried out in line with our objectives, as set out in our Business Plan, of improving the health and wellbeing of the local community, providing increased social benefits, empowering our community and families, reducing poverty in the area by providing essential services to help the wellbeing of the community and providing a space for children to alleviate child poverty in the area.

We realise that the car park is small in comparison to the current usage of the building therefore we have enlisted a Civil Engineering consultant to look at a possible car park expansion round the side of the centre. We also have an agreement with the SPS College across the road to share their carpark as an overflow as and when required.

Benefits of the proposal

The Falkirk Braes Community Centre provides essential services and spaces that might otherwise be inaccessible due to the financial constraints of our local community. We plan to offer employment opportunities once the asset transfer is complete, in the form of a cleaner, and a centre manager. The centre remaining open and in community ownership, will help to develop the skills and experience of our local community through volunteer places, to build upon an individual's experience and skills capacity, thus supporting our community's future employability.

Our centre hosts regular speaking confidence groups for further personal development, which can have a positive impact on an individual's job prospects and education prospects. Our users are better able to conduct themselves in interviews, within a work setting, and other social settings, meaning that they can make those meaningful and impactful relationships that can help them in their personal, professional, and educational life.

We provide multiple work experience placements to provide experience, permanent & casual employment opportunities. We support local child businesses, providing them with an affordable venue for their services.

We will have a progressive pricing structure, making it affordable to use our centre to allow access for all.

Unfortunately, due to the economic climate and the cost-of-living crisis, there has been a decline in the number of businesses, venues, and amenities in our community. The closing of a vital community building would be hugely damaging to the local area. We have plans to upgrade our space and our garden area, so that it can be enjoyed by our whole community. We plan to continue our community work to contribute to the local regeneration of the area. Our initiatives of hosting outdoor events, supporting local businesses, and advocating for community needs, means that we are actively engaging with our broader community: our community centre helps create a more vibrant, connected, and resilient local area.

We plan to regenerate the centre, so that it is a modernised, well-equipped and functional hub for our community.

By improving the overall health of the community, our group aims to help ease the pressure on public and social services, and on other facilities. Our LET helps to

combat mental health issues in our local area. By engaging in regular social activities, our community can reduce stress, improve mood, and gain a sense of purpose. Physical activities at our centre, such as yoga classes, martial arts classes, and dance classes, help maintain physical health and mobility for all those who attend them. Together, these benefits contribute to a healthier, happier, and more connected community. When individuals have access to programmes that support their social, mental, and physical health, they are less likely to require intervention from public services. This proactive approach to community health not only benefits individuals, but also reduces the burden on public resources, allowing them to be allocated more effectively, to areas where they are needed the most.

Mental Health is improved due to increased social interaction, the reduction of social isolation, and more wealth is retained within the local community.

We know that 1 in 4 people experience some form of poor mental health in their lifetime, and that mental health is an umbrella term which encompasses not only mental health problems/illness and mental health wellbeing. Therefore, it should be highlighted that the Grange could help reduce this by creating some breathing space and balancing out the mental load that those in our community are facing. We plan on opening a wellbeing cafe, that will operate from our centre, allowing individuals to interact in a safe and neutral space.

By way of encouraging physical movement, offering multiple sports and fitness offerings for all ages and abilities. Additionally offering support groups for individuals to engage with, whether that be for mental health support, or physical health support, the Grange is always there as a venue for people to come together. There is a definite increase in people being more connected and coming together, people in the local area have an increased level of fitness, thus resulting in less interactions with the NHS.

There will also be an increase in the level of personal fitness and wellbeing overall.

The activities and social interactions facilitated at the Falkirk Braes Community Centre, will contribute significantly to both the mental and social wellbeing of our community. Our centre provides a safe space for the local community to meet and engage with each other, in a vast range of activities and events.

Attendees to our centre, can form meaningful friendships, build a supportive network, and gain an increased sense of community connectedness. Allowing for better communications between peers in both adults and children. These connections can even last a lifetime, forming in childhood, and continuing into adulthood.

Equality is at the heart of everything that we do, and as a community we recognise that maintaining the Falkirk Braes Community Centre gives us the opportunity by offering services for young people to attend various classes, events, and activities.

We regularly update information via email, on our social media and notice boards to advertise support available. Our volunteers are friendly and approachable for anyone who needs further support.

We plan to continue to work in an environmentally conscious way, and we have plans to engage with funders to make energy efficiency improvements to reduce our carbon footprint on the environment and local community. These improvements contribute to a healthier, more attractive, and more liveable community, benefiting all who live here.

We regularly update information via email, on our social media and notice boards to advertise support available. Our volunteers are friendly and approachable for anyone who needs further support. Our Rag bin collected £448 worth of clothing in just 12 months which we used for the benefit of the centre.

Negative consequences

The consequences of not maintaining this facility will be detrimental to the local community, the current users, (in particular the existing clubs) who recognise the value and benefit of having such a facility. There would be an immediate negative impact to the health and wellbeing of those individuals who currently use the centre.

We have considered other potential internal negative consequences for the group taking over the building through Community Asset Transfer as:

- Costly repair work is required for the building we will need to fund
- Utility costs are high for the building, and we understand the risk of these increasing
- There is a risk of us not being able to attract enough business to ensure the hall is able to continue
- We understand there is a lot of volunteering work required for our proposal to work and are reliant on there being a continued involvement from the community to help with this

We foresee no external negative consequences for the wider community, as we are maintaining the community centre, as a going concern. Although we do have a planned need for a change of use due to introducing a commercial gym. This may increase the number of people attending the centre, therefore potentially the number of cars to the centre. To combat this, we have enlisted a Civil Engineering consultant to explore the feasibility of carpark expansion around the building.

Capacity to deliver

We have a strong committee with varying skills all willing to take a hands-on approach. Many are retirees, keen to take on the centre as a project but many are also still in full-time employment with a wide range of skills that are extremely useful for managing the centre. We are experienced in staff management and recruitment, marketing, fundraising, asset management, project management, IT, building control and facilities management.

Previous committees have been involved with the ongoing management of this centre therefore we plan to continue and improve this to the betterment of the centre now we will have full control.

We have enlisted the help of a surveyor to provide a further condition report on the building, an Architect to provide drawings of the current building and the future layout plans and a lawyer to aid in the negotiation of the CAT contract on our behalf.

We have also had various tradespeople attend the centre to confirm to us any repairs that may be required and the urgency of such – heat loss drone, quantity surveyor, structural engineer, plumber, electrician, roofing expert and a builder.






Using an online form, we consulted our community for feedback via social media, making use of local Community Facebook Groups and received 325 responses and an overwhelming positive level of encouragement. 98% of people surveyed agreed that the Grange was a valuable asset to the community

We used the information from the above survey responses, especially "Do you currently use the Grange Centre?" and tackled the issue of not enough people knowing what we offer by designing and promoting the timetable of available activities and subsequent Facebook posts to let the community know how to join in and use the centre. We have already seen an increase in the number of attendees of every club/community group that use the centre.

We also received Letters of Support from all 3 parties and our local councillors. [REDACTED] attended our Open Day and voiced his ongoing support for our endeavours.

Additionally, we have been working closely with Polmont Playgroup to develop their SCIO and CAT application for the Action Outdoors building which shares land with the Grange Centre and in the process we have been discussing the positive ways in which the two charitable organisations can benefit from each other's existence and work in partnership to promote our services to the community. Polmont Playgroup have 25-35 children and their parents coming to the Playgroup each day therefore will have the opportunity to advertise the activities of the Grange Centre to these parents who otherwise may not have been onsite at the Grange or aware of the offering. Therefore, increasing footfall to the Centre also.

The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre has reserved funds of £35k therefore can afford to absorb the £1 proposed purchase cost. As shown in the below payments and receipts projections, we will rely on grants to help us stabilise the energy costs in the first year and with additional grant funding and support from Business Energy Scotland, we aim to half these costs – especially with the separation of the Action Outdoors building. Additionally, in the below, it only incorporates 3 months of the commercial gym and massage therapist permanent lets, therefore as you can see in the attached 5-year plan, this boosts our income in further years.

Also, we plan to continue to increase the usage of our Sports Hall and other available rooms to bring in additional funds to give us freedom, flexibility and further financial security.

Additionally, we have 20 volunteer members, each working a total of 6 hours per month on average. Their expertise equates to £12 per hour. Together this saves a total of 5,600 paid hours per year at a cost of £183,680. Looking at these projections over 5 years, the savings would be:

Year 1 - £183,680

Year 2-3 - £386,845



The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre Business Plan

1. Introduction

The newly formed The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre, formally known as the Grange Community Education Centre Association is located at **Redding Road (B805), Brightons FK2 0AA**.

SINCE FORMING IN MAY 2024, THROUGH COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, WE HAVE INCREASED THROUGHPUT OF THE GAMES HALL OF BY 100%!

The Centre has been at the heart of the Braes community since 1972. For ease, we will refer to the centre as the Grange throughout this document.

The Grange, and therefore, Brightons is a village at the heart of the Braes and is home to many long-established businesses and is well catered for a village of its size. Due to its position, almost equidistant between Glasgow and Edinburgh the village has become a popular commuter village, with many new houses built since the start of the 1980s. Both the main Glasgow to Edinburgh and the Dunblane to Edinburgh trains stop at Polmont railway station which is within easy reach of Brightons. The M9 motorway to Edinburgh and Glasgow/Stirling is also easily accessible.

The community group wish to Community Asset Transfer (CAT) the former named Falkirk Council Property: Grange Community Education Centre, as closure of the Grange would lead to community disappointment and leave a huge gap as there are no other community centres of this size locally with a large kitchen space, sports/games hall and multi-purpose community rooms.

The group have been working together to form a plan of action, for the 987.347sqm building, which has covered a variety of improvements to support the community through Partnership Working within the Falkirk's Community Planning Partnership (CPP) ultimately to support 'People to live full and positive lives within supportive communities' (outcome) by Improving mental health and wellbeing (priority) by:

Increased social interaction and support welfare – Attendees can form friendships, build a supportive network, and gain an increased sense of community connectedness. Allowing for better communications between peers both adults and children. The activities that take place at the Grange often connect to similar activities elsewhere e.g. Archers do go to outside ranges and competitive events. This is a clear multiplier effect extending from their use of the Grange.

Promote public health – by way of encouraging physical movement, offering multiple sports and fitness offerings for all ages and abilities. Additionally offering support groups.

Reducing inequalities – Equality is at the heart of everything that we do, and as a community we recognise that maintaining the Grange gives us this opportunity by offering services for young people.

Tackle poverty – In our surrounding areas within the Wards of the Falkirk area, we know that the Children living in Absolute Poverty between 2020/21 in the Upper Braes Area was 15%, with a lesser percentage of children in poverty in Lower Braes at 12.7%, this is not just related to the cost-of-living crisis, but with inflation increases also. We have an opportunity to target poverty stricken, surrounding villages who could benefit from this centre transferring to the community. We want to introduce services to support whole family health and wellbeing, as we understand how village life and community spirit is much more difficult to generate and sustain.

Education for adults – hosting speaking confidence groups for further personal and professional development.

Support improved mental health – We know that 1 in 4 people experience some form of poor mental health in their lifetime, and that mental health is an umbrella term which encompasses not only mental health problems/illness and mental health wellbeing. Therefore, it should be highlighted that the Grange could help reduce this by creating some breathing space and balancing out the mental load.

Wellbeing support – we regularly update information via email, on our social media and notice boards to advertise support available. Our specialist group volunteers are friendly and approachable for anyone who needs further support.

Ease financial pressure – Making it affordable to use our centre to allow access for all. The facilities are available to all the community at attractive prices. This was the case before CAT and that will continue afterwards. This means that these facilities are subsidised, by the wider community.

Economic development of our local community – we can provide work experience placements to provide experience, permanent & casual employment opportunities. Support local businesses, providing them with an affordable venue for to offer their service. Local small business can base their operations at the Grange benefitting the individuals and the community.

Environmental mindfulness – we offer a clothing recycling bin, battery recycling, tetra pak recycling and ink cartridge recycling points - all helping our fundraising. Lead by example, reducing our carbon footprint.

With all the above taken into consideration, our efforts are demonstrating how our activities bring clear social and welfare benefits to local people in our community, that would otherwise not be provided if a reasonable and fair price was offered by Falkirk Council to allow the CAT purchase to complete. We want to support a thriving economy, and work alongside Falkirk Council to plan services and share resources to best tackle the challenges.

Our current and future aims are to KEEP THE GRANGE OPEN and:


- 1. The advancement of citizenship or community development within the surrounding areas of the Upper and Lower Braes Council Wards to facilitate social interaction
- 2. The advancement of educational equity, in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life for the persons for whom the facilities or activities are primarily intended.
- 3. To provide, or assist in the provision of, facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation, where such provision or assistance is:
 - a) in the interests of social welfare.
 - b) made with the object of improving the condition of the life of the members of the community in the area of benefit
 - for the purposes to associate with voluntary organisations and inhabitants in the area of benefit.

Over the last few years our community centre has lacked in any programme to develop and drive usage, we believe that we have the necessary skills as a management committee to manage our building and deliver the best for our community. We have already recruited many new groups to the centre and will continue in this vein focusing on our desire to become a Sports and wellbeing centre. Our CAT committee have brought their personal and professional skills with them to achieve this transfer. This will continue into the future as members move and new members are recruited. We have become a management training centre.

As such and in summary, we want to Community Asset Transfer (CAT) purchase the following Falkirk Council Property:

The yellow area in the above diagram defined the boundaries of the CAT. We are also working extremely closely with Polmont Playgroup in their CAT application for the Action Outdoors building (blue area), and we will share a carpark, while also discussing plans to maintain and expand existing carpark.

We are not aware of any other parties declaring an interest in a community asset transfer of the above property. Our proposed plan will keep the aforementioned asset in community usage, and we will strive to make it an ongoing success.

We are unaware of any restriction on the use of the asset, designation, or listing, that would prohibit Falkirk Council from disposing of the asset.

1.1. Objectives

Our key objectives are to offer the community of the Braes a quality service and to build a successful community hub giving it a financially secure and sustainable future.

We will carry out all our activities with the Falkirk Plan 2021 – 2030, at the forefront of our minds. As such, our strategic priorities are directly aligned with "fewer people struggle with feeling socially isolated or lonely" (Falkirk Page 21, 'outcome 12)

Our future aims are to:

- have a building that is sustainable, ensuring it is energy efficient and low cost to run
- have a range of income sources to cover the costs of running the building and maintenance, such as grants, donations, letting space, seeking sponsorship to supplement out primary income of community sports club fees.
- make use of good ideas and resources within the community and adapt to changing circumstances
- be a collaborative effort, where many people in the community are involved
- provide a means for alternative approaches to service delivery underpinned by the principles of community involvement and partnership
- facilitate a place where different local partners in a neighbourhood can come together and address the issues that matter most to them
- Encourage charitable activities through which centre users and our community may support the development of the Grange.

We believe that we have a diverse range of necessary skillsets to manage our building and get the best for our community. Our group aims to offer a provision of recreational facilities, or the organisation of recreational activities to tackle poverty and inequity, with a positive, flexible and adaptive approach.

We will follow the strategic direction of The Falkirk Plan 2021-2030, and the Falkirk Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) Strategic Plan 2023-2026 to help improve the lives of people of Falkirk. The focus of offering Community-based services will be at the forefront of our hearts and minds when

aiming to achieve our priorities once agreed upon, and, wherever practicable, with reference to page 21 of the Falkirk Plan, 'outcome 12: fewer people struggle with feeling socially isolated or lonely.

The existing groups that regularly use the facilities at the centre, who's representatives form the SCIO Trustee's & management committee, hope to initially manage the centre to help sustain the future of the Grange.

The committee will also continue to work with all neighbouring groups and partners to expand the offer of the centre. Exploring opportunities such as expanding the offer to be a potential 'Community Sports Hub' or working with partners to co-design internal areas that have the potential to bring in greater income.

Detailed discussions with Business Energy Scotland have produced an agreed plan that when fully implemented should reduce our energy consumption by 66% and reduce our carbon footprint by 30 tonnes of CO2.

We will be abandoning electric underfloor heating throughout the building. This will be replaced by local heating sources to be managed by the centre users, one hour at a time.

Grant aid is available, and we are working to put as much of this plan in place as soon as possible.

1.2. Benefits for the Local Community

We currently have long term lets from local community groups such as Badminton, Central Scotland Speakers Club, social Table Tennis, Stirlingshire Table Tennis club, Wee Country Respite, Central Scotland Ballet School, Golf Pro's, Meta Fit, Hatha Yoga, Braes Football Club, Councillor Surgeries, Grange Archery Club & a Basketball group.

We work with the community, for the community. We will continue to develop partnerships with local organisations, service providers and community groups as we develop our business model and embed it into the community.

Our vision is to provide a community led space that helps deliver long-term, social, economic, sustainable and environmental benefits to the local community.

Our values are based on:

- Working in an inclusive and respectful manner, not discriminating against anyone
- Being a not-for-profit organisation and investing any surplus in the advancement of facilities for the local community
- Being community led
- Intergenerational approach to serving all age ranges in the community
- Provide a space for mental health support services for the local community
- Innovative and proactive approach to local people's needs

Our objectives are:

- To improve health and wellbeing of the local community
- Provide increased social benefits
- Empower our community and families
- Reduce poverty in the area by providing essential services to help the wellbeing of the community
- Provide a space for children to help alleviate child poverty in the area

Measuring Performance (KPI)

We will measure the performance of the centre on a monthly, quarterly and yearly basis, against our aims to increase usage by 20% within the first 2 years – currently at 6.12% of full capacity therefore plenty of room for improvement.

We will also measure the number of users (person hours per week) attending each session, so we can see the impact on group attendance to ensure it is growing and therefore we are supporting these groups to be sustainable.

We will monitor our social impact by collecting information on the demographics of hall users, gathering feedback in terms of health and social benefits of users.

2. The Group status

The charity, The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre and has the legal status of a Scottish charity, SCIO number SC053512. The original committee group originally formed in 1998 and have successfully been running the building under the management of Falkirk Council. The new charity has now become a two-tiered SCIO with active membership and is run by a board of trustees. Members will be drawn from a range of local people and organisations who have an interest in the building.

The SCIO was formed to benefit the people of the Lower and Upper Braes local council (Ward 8 and 9), Falkirk.

The Grange will offer a full range of services including spaces to rent; health and fitness sessions; community social events; and community engagement events for groups, businesses and individuals. Initially it will be managed by volunteers from our membership group, however, we may in the future look at employing an individual to manage the building lets, clean, and maintain the centre. General membership is open to all individuals and groups residing or operating within The Braes (Ward 8 & 9) and the surrounding areas. They may vote on matters to be decided at all Annual General Meetings. Anyone else with an interest in The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre and its activities, may apply to become an Associate member.

We have Public Liability insurance for £5m

2.1. Exemptions

We do not intend to seek VAT exemption as a registered SCIO as we do not purchase enough to reap this benefit, but we will continue to monitor our purchase to balance the potential return.

We will seek full mandatory and discretionary rates relief from Falkirk Council.

We will be exempt from water charges as a registered SCIO and have an income below £300,000 - https://www.mygov.scot/water-sewerage-exemption

2.2. Initial Development Plan


The Grange is a well-used, and a much-loved venue in the local village. Upon entering, visitors are greeted by a reception desk that branches off into various sections of the building. We have multiple office and meeting rooms, general purpose rooms, café area with a well-equipped kitchen and a games hall. The facility also boasts accessible access from the carpark and restrooms on the upper level, catering to the needs of all patrons. However, there is no accessible access to the Games Hall or lower-level restrooms, therefore this is a development we are considering.

In the first year we will only make essential repairs but where external grant funding allows will develop and progress a staged energy efficiency programme to significantly reduce utility costs.

The organisation's commitment to improvement is further evidenced by our recent successful application to recruit Iron House Strength Gym who will fund and renovate space on the upper floor of the Grange, who's lettings income would be reinvested into the charitable purposes.

We plan to specifically target the fitness class letting market, encourage community groups and work in partnership with Iron House Scotland Ltd - Strength Gym and Sports Massage, presenting a dedicated Strength and Conditioning gym to the local community.

Below is the area designated on the upper floor for the new gym and sports massage room.

As residents of the area we will provide a dedicated gym, closer to home open to the community as well as a targeted membership."

About Strength Gyms

Currently there are, across the Central Region of Scotland (Stirling/West Lothian/Falkirk), approx. four non-dedicated strength gyms, however, they do facilitate strength training to a degree. Many of these gyms operate very small windows of time each day. Many people will travel from Glasgow to Edinburgh to take out a day pass to train in one of these gyms. These people will therefore have, along with a gym membership, personal training sessions just to train on the specialised equipment. Monthly memberships will be offered with the potential of up to 100 members. There will also be a daily pass offer of £10.

We estimate that the current usage of the redesigned general-purpose room for a monthly income c£1,500. We would look to increase that by 3% in Year 2 and 3. This would include contributions towards the electricity usage.

Security of building

Investment into the security of the building as a whole to ensure both the gym users/members and other users of the building are safe and secure, potentially via a fob type entry system with controllable access by management, all obviously to be discussed and agreed.

Existing Building

In addition to the above-mentioned gym, we will offer the following range of services including: - Hire of the each of the rooms - 2 x offices, committee room, youth room, potentially commercial lease of the Kitchen and primarily continued and increased community sports group letting to the sports hall.

These facilities have the potential to be booked out individually, or in whole. This would allow:

- Ability to hire for parties, events, fundraisers
- Ability to hire meeting space for corporate meetings and events
- Ability to book separate spaces
- Sports equipment to be left in storage in the games hall store
- Regular committee led events for the community, including summer fun days, seasonal discos/dances, coffee mornings, prize bingo, etc.
- Fitness classes
- Offer meeting rooms with wireless internet connection which will be available to public and/or people renting the space
- Ability to book a workspace for the day for those who don't want to go into the office but don't want to work from home. With the ability to book for an hour up to the full day or week

- Have a range of income sources to cover the costs of running the building, maintenance, such as grants, donations, hiring out space and delivering contracts
- Be a collaborative effort, where many people in the community are involved
- Provide a means for alternative approaches to service delivery underpinned by the principles of community involvement and partnership
- Facilitate a place where different local partners in a neighbourhood can come together and address the issues that matter most to them
- Walking Groups; Cycling Groups; Businesses for team building and away days
- A unique space for training and development

In collaboration with Falkirk Council, an agreement has been reached to proceed with the lowering of the reception desk, making it more accessible. Promising enhanced functionality and continued service to the community.

We will endeavour to work with all our partners in the area, including local businesses.

We would not block off the rear pedestrian access linking to the Wimpey housing estate, allowing free pedestrian flow and access to the jetty.

3. Market Information

3.1. Products and Services

We aim to install internet services throughout the building and replace the IT infrastructure – we have already secured funding for this.

3.2. Market

Our target market will be local community groups, clubs and organisations within the Braes and surrounding areas, within the Falkirk and Braes community.


The centre will look to maintain the existing clubs and set charging fees for both Keyholders and non-keyholders to allow us to minimise reliance on staffing/volunteer requirement.

The size of the market is estimated at 32,149 as according to Falkirk Council, the population of Ward 8 is 15.670 and Ward 9 is 16.479.

Prior to the SPR announcement, the Games Hall usage was 21%, which has been expanded through community engagement effort to 40.05% and would aim to be increased to 60% capacity within 5 years.

We have thoroughly researched the above information and believe that by offering a community space that is cost effective, generating sufficient income to build and maintain a viable centre would be of benefit to the local community. We believe that we will differentiate from the above competitors as we have a dedicated 3 court sports/games hall. Next year, in 2025 and in line with the SPR project, we will see the closure of Polmont Sports Centre, therefore we will become the only dedicated centre with a games hall within the upper and lower braes area.

3.4. Negative Consequences

The consequences of not maintaining this facility will be detrimental to the local community, the current users, (in particular the existing clubs) who recognise the value and benefit of having such a facility. There would be an immediate negative impact to the health and wellbeing of those individuals who currently use the centre.

We have considered other potential internal negative consequences for the group taking over the building through Community Asset Transfer as:

- · Costly repair work is required for the building we will need to fund
- Utility costs are high for the building, and we understand the risk of these increasing
- There is a risk of us not being able to attract enough business to ensure the hall is able to continue
- We understand there is a lot of volunteering work required for our proposal to work and are reliant on there being a continued involvement from the community to help with this

We foresee no external negative consequences for the wider community, as we are maintaining the community centre, as a going concern. Although we do have a planned need for a change of use due to introducing a commercial gym. This may increase the number of people attending the centre, therefore potentially the number of cars to the centre. To combat this, we have enlisted a Civil Engineering consultant to explore the feasibility of carpark expansion around the building.


3.5. Community Engagement


A survey was posted online using a Google Form questionnaire through our Facebook page, distributed widely within the community on social media and via a QR code on the paper copies posted throughout the building and community.

A total of 325 people have completed so far, each person was limited to 1 response. Below is a breakdown of the questions asked and the information received:


Do you currently use The Grange Community Centre? 325 responses




Do you feel a local community centre is an asset to the area? 325 responses

3.6. Marketing Activities

FALKIRK HERALD - We will continue to contact the Falkirk Herald as we have been doing throughout this process to raise the profile of the centre. We invited a freelance government journalist to visit the centre to interview our team on the progress being made in this process. This was reported in the Falkirk Herald in print, online and on the Daily Mail website and Facebook page.

NOTICEBOARDS – We have large notice boards at the entrance to the Grange and we will continue to utilise these to advertise as many groups, classes and information as we can. We will also conduct regular advertising via posters in community facilities and local shops: we will ensure that The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre is advertised and promoted where possible.

FACEBOOK PAGE – We have an active Facebook Page "The Falkirk Braes Grange Centre" and growing presence due to regular posting with a consistent and increasing interaction. Most of our posts are shared by the local councillors and shared on to local community groups such as 'Braes Blether'. We use Highquality visuals (photos, videos, banners) will showcase our activities. A recent reel posted to Facebook has had over £11k plays!

We are currently looking into booking systems which would be installed as an add-on to Facebook to reduce costs and reduce the number of platforms to manage.

WEBSITE – We are considering the idea of a website, which could potentially host our booking system, but we are using Facebook currently and we might find this is the best approach and a website is not required, therefore resulting in a saving.

WORD OF MOUTH – In relation to the continued promotion of our community centre, word of mouth through the local community's active engagement will remain a key component. We recognise the value

and impact of social media, and we will make strong efforts to promote our services through Facebook to keep people talking about the available services at the Grange. We aim to continue with the established clientele, and benefit from recommendations to bring in additional opportunities.

EVENTS – We are hosting a fundraising event in September to increase the number of people coming to the centre and having a look around. We hope to make events a regular occurrence in the Grange so we can get as many eyes inside as possible.

3.7. Prices and Margins

We have carried out extensive checks on the prices being charged by our main competitors and have based our prices on being competitive with them. The attached Financial Appendices show that this pricing structure will allow me to make sufficient profit to build a viable business.

Our forecasts for 2024/25 are based on the following sample prices and costs for the most popular products and services:

The overall gross margin will depend on the sales mix that is achieved in the business. See Financial Projections in Appendix 1 for detail.

3.8. Community Asset Transfer Plan

The current valuation of the building was provided by Ryden from Falkirk Council to the value of £175k. Essential repairs (as demonstrated in the Conditional Survey Report – appendices) to the building are £5,000 which Falkirk Council will be required to undertake to ensure that the building is wind and watertight, and statutorily compliant. Although we would like to question the use of the £5k ringfenced for the lowering of the reception counter in line with compliance when we have a disabled toilet which only access is both down or up stairs. We expect to have to carry out additional repairs in the value of £327,885 according to the conditional survey, over the next 5 years, to bring the building up to an acceptable standard and fit for purpose. We propose that the community benefit we can provide is £1,125,228 over the next 5 years; £504,930 benefit in year 1. We propose to pay the value of £1.00 for the purchase of the Grange.

We will endeavour to put in place relevant permissions, funding, and partnerships during the asset transfer process.

We have calculated the group's Board of Trustees volunteering hours based on monthly meetings of our board of trustees and all volunteering work carried out by the board, when individuals are acting in their capacity as a Trustee of the Board.



5. People

We have eight Management Trustees (including one co-opted member) as well as a strong team of talented, experienced and dedicated members supporting us. Each year the Trustees are voted in, and we support vice roles to ensure smooth succession planning.

The committee have successfully run the charity side of the Grange Community Centre for 50 years. We have built up relationships with reliable local volunteers and tradespeople who have offered to help us with maintenance of our building.

The previous management committee utilised a bookkeeper and Accountant, however our Treasurer plans to perform our necessary financial record keeping and make use of a volunteer Financial Accountant, using our extensive business contacts, to complete our Annual Return to OSCR.

Chair – [REDACTED]: A user of the Grange Centre as a teenager and now the base for my football team – Braes FC, I have a strong affiliation to the building and the drive to keep it open. A committee member for the long haul and a member of the local community, I understand the responsibilities in relation to good governance for our charity and take these seriously. I have demonstrated our effectiveness as trustees and will continue to build on this. An Asset Manager & Senior Project Manager for a housing association, with financial and technical knowledge around managing buildings. Enthusiastic and willing to do whatever it will take to help save the centre.

Treasurer – [REDACTED]: We will carry out the necessary record keeping from home and employ a local Accountant to complete our annual Return to OSCR. Also, chairperson of the Grange Archery club which has been using the Grange Centre for approximately 20 years. Competitive Archer in local and national competitions. Qualified Civil Engineer and is currently the national Engineering Manager for a Construction Contractor in the rail industry. I was also secretary of the Grange CEA committee.

Vice Treasurer – [REDACTED]: Came to Scotland as a child and lived in the local area for more than forty years. Works as a Planning Manager for main contractor in the construction industry to deliver construction projects in Central Scotland for the past 20 years. Passion for sports with basketball as the main sport within the family. All my kids play for Falkirk Fury. I play at the Grange Centre basketball group which I help organise to bring together local players who want to enjoy basketball at recreational level. Willing to help with various roles to help the Falkirk Braes Grange Centre

Secretary – [REDACTED]: A committee member in various roles with Polmont Playgroup for 7 years ensuring its survival through lockdown, a charity governed by OSCR since 2018 having been both a Treasurer and Chair. Sit on the Polmont Community Council Committee and attends Polmont Community Hub meetings – can therefore share experiences/knowledge of this process. I try to be innovative, inclusive and pioneering to serve the local community when fundraising. I am an IT Professional in the Financial Services Industry; an effective decision maker and I also run a successful Social Media Management business and have previous knowledge of the CAT process and application.

Vice Secretary – [REDACTED]: Heavily involved in volunteering through local community sport (Table Tennis) for the last 15+ years, sitting on management committees throughout this time in various roles. Also, a qualified coach in the sport, passionate about creating opportunities for young people to develop their skills in a supportive local setting. In my day job I am a qualified Actuary working for a large insurance company, requiring strong decision making and understanding of financial/customer impacts.

Trustee – [REDACTED]: Born and raised in the Braes. I have a successful Sports Therapy business; I retrained in my late thirties to achieve this, and I wear all the hats from promotion to accounting and handling financial matters to carrying out the main business purpose. I have had a period of living abroad with my husband and his work. It taught me about other cultures, understanding, patience and ability to adapt. In my main day job, I am a caseworker for Department for Work and Pensions, handling policy and procedures, making evidence-based decisions that affect the wellbeing of children. Working as a team and individually to maintain service level agreements.

Trustee – [REDACTED]: I am a professional chemist and worked at BP Chemicals after university. In 1982 I left and became a sole trader supplying chemical materials to the construction industry for dealing with dampness, timber decay and structural repairs. I provided training and technical support work that I still do even though past normal retirement age. I have personally saved two Scottish farmhouses from dereliction and done a barn conversion to modern standards in addition to the hundreds of properties that I

have worked on during my business years. The Grange is my latest project. Some of the works to repair and upgrade will cost money, some only require a rethink about how we can manage the Centre.

Trustee - [REDACTED]: I am president of the Central Scotland Speakers Club, affiliated to The Association of Speakers Clubs. I have been involved with the speakers club for over 20 years and we have been based in The Grange Centre for the last 10 years, recruiting members from across the Falkirk area. I was previously treasurer of The Grange Community Education Association, and I am committed to supporting The Grange as it is such a valuable community asset. During the initial process I was very involved in marketing the idea of developing The Grange as a community asset and engaging with the local community, this is something I am happy to continue doing.

Our members are fully appraised through our monthly committee meetings, minutes and daily via our WhatsApp group on our current projects and our achievement path to target. We have several talents in our members group ranging from committee experience, running sporting groups which use the Grange Centre (and other centres), Project Managers, building surveyors, confident DIYers and a number of local retirees who can donate their time to the running of the services.

6. Finance

We have worked hard as a group to review our 5-Year cashflow and sales plan. This is based on our recent experiences and market research.

The group measure the performance of the centre on a monthly, quarterly and yearly basis, aiming to increase usage by 20% within the first 2 years - currently at 6.12% of full capacity therefore plenty of room for improvement.

The group also measures the number of users(person hours per week) attending each session, this enables the group to assess attendance ensuring it is growing and therefore supporting groups and their sustainability.

Recent consultation showed extensive support for keeping the centre open. With 98% agreeing that The Grange Centre was a valuable asset to the community.

The group have identified in the tackling poverty section of the business plan that, "In our surrounding areas within the Wards of the Falkirk area, we know that the Children living in Absolute Poverty between 2020/21 in the Upper Braes Area was 15%, with a lesser percentage of children in poverty in Lower Braes at 12.7%, this is not just related to the cost-of-living crisis, but with inflation increases also. We have an opportunity to target poverty stricken, surrounding villages who could benefit from this centre transferring to the community. We want to introduce services to support whole family health and wellbeing, as we understand how village life and community spirit is much more difficult to generate and sustain."
