A - Quantitative Evidence

2022/23 projected year end total admissions = 18,580 visits

2021/22 total admissions = 14,423 visits

2021/22 General activity admissions = Adult 4,691 (32%), Junior 8,451 (59%) Go Card 1,317 (9%). Gender, age and postcode are not captured for general admissions.

2022/23 Sports Development Classes to end Q3 = 7,182 admissions

Gender split - 31% female, 67% male, 2% not specified.

90% of participants in the sports development programme are aged under 12 years. 9% are aged under 16 years and 1% adults.

Social - case studies; personal / group feedback / other

Council carried out a series of public consultation meetings and online surveys for communities to provide feedback on SPR proposal. Email correspondence was also accepted.

85 survey responses received from users of the facility (72), on behalf of a community group / organisation (1), residents of the ward (10), not answered (2)

Gender of responses received - female 43, male 37, not answered 5.

71 respondents stated they would be disproportionately affected by the SPR proposal for this venue.

The age profile of respondents

16 - 24 years - 1 responses, 25 - 44 years - 38 responses, 45 - 64 years - 31 responses, 65+ years - 10 responses, not answered 5 responses.

The majority of the response received did not select a protected characteristic when completing the survey.

Summary of comments received:

Negative impact on the community with the loss of a venue offering a wide range of sports, lack of capacity within existing sports venues, viability of using schools as an alternative location, physical & mental health and wellbeing, access to transport and associated costs to travel were the most common concerns raised.

Summary of responses stating protected characteristics:

AGE: 7 responses, 4 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 7 responses, 3 are female, 4 male.

45 - 64 years received the most responses with 3, 25 - 44 years and 65+ both received 2 responses.

Negative impact on physical and mental health, ability to travel to an alternative venue and age discrimination against young people and the elderly were the most common concerns raised. Concerns over the viability of accessing schools as an alternative venue were also noted.

<u>DISABILITY:</u> 3 responses, all state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 3 responses, 2 are female, 1 male. All responses were received from 25 - 44 years age category.

Negative impact on ability to travel to an alternative venue was the main concern.

SEXUAL ORIENTATION. MATERNITY / PREGNANACY: both received 1 response each. Viability of relocating to alternative venue, impact on physical health and

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loss of social interaction were the most common concerns raised.

MARITAL STATUS: 3 response, 2 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 3 responses, 2 are female, 1 male. All responses were received from 25 - 44 years age category.

Viability of relocating to alternative venue, impact on physical health and loss of social interaction were the most common concerns raised.
