**Social - case studies; personal / group feedback / other**

Council carried out a series of public consultation meetings and online surveys for communities to provide feedback on SPR proposal. Email correspondence was also accepted.

983 survey responses received from users of the facility (833), on behalf of a community group / organisation (95), residents of the ward (54), not answered (1)

Gender of responses received - female 518, male 430, not answered 27. other 8.

798 respondents stated they would be disproportionately affected by the SPR proposal for this venue.

The age profile of respondents

Under 16 years - 43 responses, 16 - 24 years - 125 responses, 25 - 44 years - 251 responses, 45 - 64 years - 456 responses, 65+ years - 82 responses, not answered - 26 responses.

The majority of the responses received did not select a protected characteristic when completing the survey.

Summary of comments received:

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue, impact on people with disabilities having access to suitable adapted training facilities, age discrimination against young people, ability to travel to an alternative venue, personal safety, viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision were the most common concerns raised.

Summary of responses stating protected characteristics:

**AGE:** 82 responses, 19 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 82 responses, 50 are female, 27 male, 2 not answered and 3 other. 45 - 64 years received the most responses with 30, all other age groups and not answered received less than 16 responses in each age group.

Negative impact on physical and mental health, social interaction, ability to travel to an alternative venue and loss of sport specific venue were the most common concerns raised. Concerns over age discrimination against young people, affordability, personal safety, viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision making process were also noted.

**DISABILITY:** 68 responses, 41 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 68 responses, 38 are female, 26 male, 3 not answered and 1 other. 45 - 64 years received the most responses with 22, closely followed by 25 - 44 years with 21 responses all other age groups and not answered received less than 16 responses in each age group.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and the impact on people with disabilities having access to suitable adapted training facilities were the most common concerns raised. Concerns over age discrimination against young people, ability to travel to an alternative venue, personal safety, viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision making process were also noted.

**SEX:** - 45 responses, 14 state they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 45 responses 39 are female, 2 male, other 4. 25 - 44 years received the most responses with 15, closely followed by 16 -24 and 45 - 64 years years with 11 responses , all other age groups were

represented receiving less than 5 responses in each age group.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue, young people, females participation in sport, physical & mental health were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over personal safety, travel, affordability and impact on disabled athletes were also noted.

**ETHNICITY:** 14 responses, 2 state they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 14 responses 7 are female, 5 male, other 1, not answered 1. 16 - 24 years received the most responses with 5, closely followed by 25 - 44 years with 4 responses, all other age groups received less than 2 or no response.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over females participation in sport, physical & mental health, personal safety, travel, affordability and impact on disabled athletes were also noted.

**RELIGION:** 14 responses, 6 state they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 14 responses 6 are female, 6 male, other 1, not answered 1. 25 - 44 years received the most responses with 6, closely followed by 45 - 64 years with 5 responses, all other age groups received less than 2 or no response.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over females participation in sport, physical & mental health, personal safety, travel, affordability, impact on disabled athletes viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision making process were also noted.

**SEXUAL ORIENTATION:** 15 responses, 6 state they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 15 responses 11 are female, 3 male, not answered 1. 25 - 44 years received the most responses with 8, closely followed by 16 - 24 years with 5 responses, all other age groups received less than 1 or no response.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over females participation in sport, physical & mental health, personal safety were also noted.

**TRANSGENDER:** 5 responses, 1 states they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 5 responses 3 are female, 1 male, not answered 1. 45 - 64 years received the most responses with 3, 16 - 24 and 65+ years received 1 response.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over physical & mental health, personal safety and impact on disabled athletes were also noted.

**PREGNANCY / MATERNITY:** 3 responses, 1 states they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 3 responses all are female in the 25 - 44 years age group.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over physical & mental health, affordability and viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision making process were also

noted.

**MARITAL STATUS:** 12 responses, 6 state they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 12 responses 8 are female, 2 male, 2 other. 25 - 44 years received the most responses with 8, 45 - 64 years and 65+ received less than 3 responses in each category.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over physical & mental health, safety, affordability and viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision making process were also noted.

**POVERTY:** 21 responses, 8 state they have physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 21 responses 12 are female, 7 male, other 2. 25 - 44 years and 45 - 64 years received the most responses with 8 in each category, 16 - 24 years with 4 responses, 65 + years with 1 response.

Negative impact on the loss of sport specific venue, affordability and young people were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close with no suitable alternative. Concerns over physical & mental health, girls and their safety, and viability of an asset transfer to clubs and the councils decision making process were also noted.
